Fort Bowie lies between the Dos Cabezas and Chiricahua Mountains, sited in a strategic pass. Over a century has passed since the U.S. Army served on America's western frontier. We will explore the observance and practices by the "military Christmas in the Old Army at Fort Bowie (now a National Historic Site) while thinking about its celebration in more current times. As you might suspect, it is decidedly much different today. Even then, soldiers deployed in the field never forgot Christmas Day. To be sure, it was celebrated as much as possible with extra rations and lightened duty, but how? Troops in garrison celebrated in a much more elaborate fashion with sanctioned relief from the monotony of duty in isolated and remote forts spread across the western frontier like Fort Bowie.
