1. GENERAL FUNCTIONS

1.01 Call to Order

Mr. Hudgins called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m.

1.02 Pledge of Allegiance

Mr. Hudgins led the Pledge of Allegiance.

1.03 Adoption of Agenda

The agenda was adopted without modification.

Mr. DiPeso moved, and Ms. Money seconded a motion to adopt the meeting agenda. With no further discussion, the Governing Board approved, with Mr. DiPeso, Mr. Farr, Mr. Hudgins, Mr. Leeder, and Ms. Money all voting aye. **MOTION PASSED**.

1.04 Citizen's In-person Interim

1.05.1 Representative to the Arizona Association of Community College Trustees (AACCT)

There were no new AACCT updates.

1.05.2 Senate Report

No Senate report was provided as the November 2025 meeting was canceled.

1.05.3 Student Government Association (SGA)

A written Student Government Association report was submitted in the board packet and was accepted as published.

1.05.4 College President

Dr. Perey, the College President, thanked all members of the college community, including staff, faculty, students, and the board, for their remarkable dedication. Dr. Perey then provided updates to the Governing Board; highlights include:

Legislative Update:

State Legislative Outlook:

- The 2026 Arizona legislative session will begin on January 12th, and as it approaches, the overall fiscal context continues to remain tight. Revenue growth is falling short of initial projections, and the Joint Legislative Budget Committee currently estimates that only about \$67 million in discretionary General Fund dollars will be available for FY 2027. Soft sales tax revenues, paired with potential state conformity to federal law, could result in revenue reductions of more than \$400 million in FY 2026 and \$330 million in FY 2027. Although the state has approximately \$1.2 billion in reserves, there is no discussion of drawing on those funds. The institution submitted our budget to the Governor in September, and the Governor will submit her budget to the legislature in January. Despite the uncertain economy, she has signaled in her plan that there will be tax cuts. Although there is no official deadline for passing the budget, a government shutdown could occur if a budget is not passed by June 30th.
- Arizona legislators prepare for the 2026 session with 32 prefilled measures (bills)
- Lawmakers introduced 1,724 bills last year, the second most in state history
- As always, the college remains proactive in advocacy.
- Two weeks ago, the president met with Senator Gowan, Representatives Diaz and Griffin to reinforce the critical work that is done at Cochise College and the positive impacts the college has on Cochise County, the communities, and the residents.

Federal Update:

- With the federal government reopening, Congress has resumed work on rulemaking and appropriations.
- Workforce Pell
 - The U.S. Department of Education is moving forward with the implementation of Workforce Pell through the federal rulemaking process. In early December 2025, the Department released a draft of regulatory language outlining how short-term workforce programs may qualify for Pell Grant eligibility, including funding and accountability requirements.
 - Draft regulations include stronger guardrails than prior Pell rules, including:
 - State-level approval of eligible programs, in coordination with workforce boards. Our Group meets with the Governor's team on December 11th
- In November, the U.S. Department of Education (DOE) announced that it had signed major interagency agreements with the Departments of State, Labor, Interior, and Health & Human Services to begin offloading various DOE programs.
 - The changes announced today include:
 - Elementary and secondary education programs moving to the Department of Labor

- Postsecondary education programs (not including the student loan portfolio) moving to the Department of Labor
- Likely to include:
 - Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs, including Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act functions, Adult Education and Family Literacy Act (AEFLA) programs (currently under WIOA Title II), and Postsecondary workforce and skills-based education programs.

The College will continue to closely monitor federal regulatory changes, evolving accountability expectations, and shifting national priorities. At the same time, we remain focused on positioning the institution to be fully compliant.

 - Meeting on December 5th revealed that additional changes were needed for priority asset ranking and clarification
 - The delivery phase is dependent on report review and acceptance.

 - Escrow documents signed for the City of Douglas wellsite parcel
 - IGA and waterline easement review in progress
 - Wellsite development is tentatively to start in March

- AdultEd (400) Renovation/Drainage Improvements
 - Roof demolition delayed due to weather; rescheduled for 12/8

Initiatives:

A reflection on the work done this year and where the college is headed in the coming year.

- Over the past year, the College has been very intentional about advancing a focused set of priorities and initiatives centered on student success, workforce alignment, and long-term sustainability. Much of this year's work has focused on strengthening our foundation, improving systems, aligning planning and budgeting, and ensuring that we make decisions grounded in our mission. That foundation positions us well to continue building momentum moving forward.
- From a student success perspective, this year, the college continued to explore how to define and measure success. The college is moving beyond access and completion to also examining post-completion outcomes, such as transfer and employment.
- Workforce development remained a major priority this year as economic and workforce needs across Cochise County continue to evolve. The college strengthened partnerships with business, industry, and public agencies; expanded short-term credentials, apprenticeships, and contract training; and began positioning the College for emerging opportunities.
- Academically and institutionally, a significant amount of work has been invested this year in preparation for our upcoming Higher Learning Commission comprehensive accreditation visit. That process has reinforced the importance of integrated, institution-wide planning.
- Financial stewardship has also been a key theme this year. The college has remained focused on using resources responsibly while planning for future investments in facilities, deferred maintenance, technology infrastructure, and targeted growth areas.
- The faculty and staff remain the college's most important resources. This year, there was a strong emphasis on supporting people through thoughtful recruitment, leadership development, and intentional preparation for long-serving leaders approaching retirement. Overall, this past year has been about laying the groundwork; the year ahead will be about building that foundation in a disciplined, intentional, and mission-focused way.

3.02 Business, Career, and Technical Education Division Report

Mr. Quintin Molina, Dean of Business, Career, and Technical Education, provided a presentation on the Business, Career, and Technical Education Division; highlights include:

Dean Molina began his presentation by thanking and recognizing his team, as well as his department assistant, Kathy Carrillo, and Dr. Kristy Ritter, who had previously served as division dean.

Agriculture:

- Hydroponic Nutrient Injection System water recycling system installed.
- Vertical Hydroponic towers are producing leafy greens, herbs, and strawberries.
- Curriculum has been updated to meet student needs and transfer requirements.

Automotive:

- Student count for Fall 2025 is 85, up 4 percent for Fall 2025
- Curriculum update is complete.

- EV/Battery cooling Trainer is nearing completion
 - Battery cooling system – built by instructor Anderson

Welding:

- Number of Graduates Increased from 15 to 72
- 192 students and 960 credit hours
 - M-Thurs starting at 6:30 am for classes.

- Completed requirements for CWI Authorized Testing Facility – one of only three in Arizona
 - Three qualified, working on a fourth individual

Questions/Comments:

Mr. Farr noted that in previous years, it has been challenging to retain residential construction students throughout the semester and asked if this issue persists. Mr. Molina responded that retention has improved significantly, largely due to effective communication about the program's purpose and structure.

Mr. Hudgins referenced the partnership the college had with the owner of the Lawley dealerships, and asked about the partnership with the new owner, Ed Morese. Dean Molina noted that the partnership is going well and that automotive instructors have met with the new owners and service managers to address any potential needs. Mr. Morse has been invited to attend the April Advisory meeting.

Dr. Perey thanked Dean Molina and his team for the amazing work with students.
